Mark Nicholls visited the Greek island of Crete and stayed in a superb hotel aimed at the solo traveller.

s the largest of the Greek islands, Crete has so much to offer; excellent beaches lapped by turquoise seas, ancient Minoan history, a wonderfulnaturallandscape and a tasty and healthy cuisine.

It hosts picturesque harbours with shoreline tavernas, small inlets where colourful fishing boats bob on the tide and is populated by a warm and welcoming people.

For many though, what caps a holiday is the accommodation and who you meet. For those who travel alone and independently, that can be more important still.

It is for these reasons that the 33-room Mistral Hotel, tucked away in the village of Maleme just a few miles east of the charismatic harbour city of Chania, is such a Cretan treasure.

It specialises in attracting those who want to go on holiday alone and meet like-minded people to take part in various activities ranging from sightseeing, walking and photography or simply chilling by the pool and lazing on a beach

Run by Vassilis Gialamarakis and his brother Adonis, the Mistral has perfected the art of singles holidays over the last two decades and taken them on to a new layed

With double-sized balconied rooms for single occupation that are spacious and stylish, the Mistral has created the ambience that makes its repeat guests as well as those visiting for the first time feel relaxed, at home and among friends. Significantly with the Mistral, once they find it, many guests know when they are on to a good thing. How many other hotels have repeat business nudging 65 per cent?

Guests cover a range of ages and backgrounds from nurses, draughtsmen, beauty therapists, a company secretary, TV producers and those who are retired.

The Mistral has two beautiful pools, quiet landscaped gardens, a lively bar area and an attractive restaurant where for dinner you can expect to be served traditional dishes such as beef stifado or souvlaki, stuffed tomatoes and peppers and superb salads, dressed in olive oil produced by the hotel from its own trees and all washed down with good local wine

Four-course evening meals are usually taken together in a lively and chatty atmosphere, while breakfast is light and relaxed with hams, cheeses, eggs, cereals, juice and coffee – perfect for the Mediterranean climate.

The Mistral also prides itself on showing Crete as it is through its food, wine and hospitality with some wonderful excursions.

A popular trip is to the perfect beach of Falasarna with its expanse of fine sand and clear waters, followed by a banquet at a family restaurant at another quiet cove at Sfinari with freshly-caught fish, a range of seafood, local wine, and the irresistible Kakavia (fish soup) on the menu.

Other excursions include trips to Elafonissi beach or a boat trip out to Gramvousa island for snorkelling, swimming and exploring Venetian ruins.

For the more adventurous, tackling the 17km of the Samaria Gorge is a truly memorable and rewarding experience. Not for the faint-hearted, it is an early morning start and a steep descent into the gorge, which becomes ever narrower before it brings you out to the beach at Aghia Rhoumeli and a cooling dip in the sea. The only way out is by boat to Chora Skafion

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Greece is most definitely is the word, if you are in the market for last minute summer holiday bargains this year.

Currently, the first thing you think of when someone mentions Greece is not the usual image of beautiful ancient ruins, sparkling blue water and white sandy beaches, but protests, unrest and unemployment. It is precisely because of these images that visitor numbers to the usually popular holiday destination have been falling. This has resulted in holiday companies being forced in to slashing their prices, in an effort to entice people back.

Even better news for consumers is that the British pound is performing pretty well against the euro at the moment, so you'll get more for your

spending money too.

While there are currently no travel restrictions in place for Brits travelling to the economically-troubled country, the Foreign Office does warn of the possibility of regular strikes which are often called at short notice and can be violent. Their advice is to avoid large crowds and demonstrations, and keep an eye on local media, as transport links are often closed at short notice due to protests. Whilet this may all sound a bit scary and off-putting, most of the civil unrest tends to be focused in and around Athens.

Therefore if you are travelling to more rural areas of the country, or to the islands, then you shouldn't encounter any problems. Should you still decide to visit the larger cities such as Athens, then you will likely find yourself rewarded not only with great value accommodation, but with bargains at restaurants and souvenir shops as well.

Back in February the already ailing tourist trade suffered a further blow when Foreign Secretary William Hague made an announcement that Britain had plans to evacuate British nationals, in the event of major civil unrest.

Angry travel companies were forced to further cut prices as holiday bookings slumped.

This Greek tragedy does represent a very good opportunity for finding some pretty astonishing deals, to destinations all over Greece.

For example I have been looking at offers travelling out in the next few weeks, and have managed to find a week self-catering on the beautiful Island of Skiathos for just £120 per person. I have also found a 4 Star allinclusive property on the Island of Rhodes for just £290 per person, "which equates to just over £40 a day". These holidays would be inclusive of flights from Gatwick and return transfers.

The golden rule for anyone looking to bag a last-minute bargain to Greece this summer is to be prepared to be flexible. This applies to the destination, departure date – even the airport you travel from. If you can keep an open mind about where you go and when, then you will surely unearth some real
